

THE LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT AND THE SMUDGING OF THE PEOPLE

Smudging by Elder Darcy O'Dell, Togendowagan Spirit Society

We gather and live on the Creator's lands, lands that have been blessed and cared for by the people and ancestors of the Crow (Apsáalooke), Northern Cheyenne (Tsétsêhéstâhese/So'taahe), Confederated Salish and Kootenai (Séliš/Qſispé/Ksanka), Blackfeet (Niitsitapi – Pikuni/Kainai/Siksika), Fort Peck Assiniboine & Sioux (Assiniboine/Nakoda), Fort Belknap Indian Community (Assiniboine – Nakoda/Gros Ventre - Aaniih), Chippewa and Cree, Sioux (Dakota/Lakota), Shoshone-Bannock, Plains Cree, Métis and Little Shell Tribes and Nations.

We recognize and honor the many generations across time immemorial of Indigenous peoples who have lived in holy relationship with these lands, long before many of us, and who continue to live among and alongside us today. We recognize the painful legacy of colonization, displacement, and broken treaties, and we commit ourselves to the ongoing work of truth-telling, healing, and reconciliation.

As members of the Episcopal Diocese of Montana, we acknowledge that this is only a first step. In the spirit of Christ's call to love, justice, and reconciliation, we commit ourselves to learning, listening, and walking together toward healing and equity for Indigenous peoples, nations, and tribes.

May this acknowledgement be more than words, may it be a living prayer, a shared journey, and a sacred responsibility with Indigenous communities across Montana and beyond. —Edited by Darcy O'Dell and read by Maggie Stockwell

Kendra, receive these keys, and let the doors of this place be open to all people.

The Canon to the Ordinary, Diocese of Montana, presents a copy of the Diocesan Canons and says

Kendra, obey these Canons, and be among us to share in the councils of this diocese.

Dean Amen.

Retired Deans present the Parish Register and say

Kendra, in this register, record the milestones of our parishioners' lives.

Dean Amen. I humbly follow the path worn in love by the feet of those who have served before me.

A READING FROM THE OLD TESTAMENT

Jeremiah 31:7-14

Thus says the Lord: Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations; proclaim, give praise, and say, "Save, O Lord, your people, the remnant of Israel." See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north, and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, those with child and those in labor, together; a great company, they shall return here. With weeping they shall come, and with consolations I will lead them back, I will let them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble; for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn. Hear the word of the Lord, O nations, and declare it in the coastlands far away; say, "He who scattered Israel will gather him, and will keep him as a shepherd a flock." For the Lord has ransomed Jacob, and has redeemed him from hands too strong for him. They shall come and sing aloud on the height of Zion, and they shall be radiant over the goodness of the Lord, over the grain, the wine, and the oil, and over the young of the flock and the herd; their life shall become like a watered garden, and they shall never languish again. Then shall the young women rejoice in the dance, and the young men and the old shall be merry. I will turn their mourning into joy, I will comfort them, and give them gladness for sorrow. I will give the priests their fill of fatness, and my people shall be satisfied with my bounty, says the Lord.



THE PROCLAMATION OF THE GOSPEL

Matthew 2:13-15,19-23

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

After the wise men had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, and remained there until the

death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I have called my son." When Herod died, an angel of the Lord suddenly appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who were seeking the child's life are dead." Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and went to the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaus was ruling over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. And after being warned in a dream, he went away to the district of Galilee. There he made his home in a town called Nazareth, so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, "He will be called a Nazorean."

RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

Bishop Kendra and people of St. Peter's: in Holy Baptism we received full adoption through God's grace and full empowerment for ministry through the Holy Spirit. Will you work together as partners in the mission of the Church, to reconcile all people to God through Christ?

People We will, with God's help.

Bishop The water of baptism signifies our eternal covenant with God. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to Christ, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Water is poured into the font. The Bishop blesses the water.

We pray you, O God, sanctify this water by the power of your Holy Spirit, that all who in baptism are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior.

The Dean Let us renew the solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism, by which

we renounce Satan and all his works, and promise to serve God faithfully

in God's holy catholic Church.

Bishop Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil and renew your commitment to

Jesus Christ?

People I do.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.

He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit

and born of the Virgin Mary.

He suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again.

He ascended into heaven,

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?

I will, with God's help.

Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

I will, with God's help.

Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ? I will, with God's help.

Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? I will, with God's help.

Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

I will, with God's help.

Bishop May Almighty God, who has given us a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, bestowed upon us the forgiveness of sins, and called us to ministry in Jesus Christ, keep us in eternal life by his grace; through Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

All Evangelical Lutheran Church in America members may rise. The Bishop of the Montana Synod brings forward a symbol of prayer, as those standing say

Kendra, may this symbol remind you of our shared life in Christ and our common practices of love, for we lift our voices in prayer together.

Dean Amen. In the Spirit of God, who searches the heart and knows our deepest needs, we pray as one.

Togendowagan members rise as a representative offers a symbol. All Togendowagan members say

Kendra, with this symbol we offer songs and praises from the ancestors who shepherd and companion us in our walk with Christ on Creator's holy ground. Let us walk and pray together.

Dean Amen. In the Spirit of God, we honor the gifts of the ancestors and bid their ongoing presence.

All Intercessors and Worship Leaders rise, as representatives bring a Book of Common Prayer. All say

Kendra, we offer this symbol of our shared life of prayer. Please join us in praying without ceasing.

Dean Amen. Let us pray with all who yearn for Christ's reconciling, healing love.

The People may stand, kneel, or sit, as able.

Dean Amen. Live without fear: your Creator has made you holy, loves you eternally, and reconciles you to one another.

The People stand, as able.

THE PEACE

The Bishop and Dean together say to the People

The Peace of Christ be always with you.

And also with you.

The Ministers and People may greet one another with a sign of Christ's peace.

Ushers will circulate to distribute stones for a presentation later in the liturgy.

The People sit.

The Bishop acknowledges and celebrates Kendra's family.

The Holy Communion

Oblation Bearers bring the people's gifts of bread and wine, pausing before the Dean.

All children and youth, with their families, teachers, and helpers, stand and say together

Kendra, please join us in growing in wisdom and grace. We want to be fed by Jesus. Please join us at Christ's table to offer and consecrate these gifts of bread and wine.

Dean Amen. Together, let us keep the feast.

The People stand as able. The Oblation Bearers continue to the altar to present the gifts.

The Bishop says an offertory sentence.

Cash and undesignated checks given today will benefit St. Peter's discretionary fund and the Diocesan discretionary fund to assist those in our communities who are in need.



Ushers present the offering plates.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you. And also with you.


Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is truly right, and good and joyful, to give you thanks, all-holy God, source of life and fountain of mercy, because you gave Jesus Christ, your only Son, to be born for us; who, by the mighty power of the Holy Spirit, was made perfectly human of the flesh of the Virgin Mary his mother; so that we might be delivered from the bondage of sin, and receive power to become your children. Therefore, joining with Angels and Archangels and with the faithful of every generation, we lift our voices with all creation as we sing:



The Presider continues

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace. But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

The People may stand, kneel, or sit, as able.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ's Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with Peter and all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. **AMEN**.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

Silence

Alleluia. We who are many are one body;

Because we share one bread and one cup. Alleluia.

The Bishop says an invitation to Holy Communion.

The People may be seated.

Please refer to the maps in the pew rack for directions to communion stations.

Ushers will indicate when to go forward.

As you come forward for communion, please bring to the ushers' baskets your stones that symbolize the spiritual house we are building together—and to remember St. Peter the rock. (Stones are available at the back of the worship space if you need one.)

Christ welcomes all to communion at his banquet table. ■ Receive the bread in the nest of your outstretched hands, and sip the wine, guiding the chalice to your lips. ■ If you do not want to sip the wine, it is also perfectly appropriate to receive the bread alone. ■ You may respond to communion by saying "Amen." ■ Tell the minister if you require gluten-free elements. ■ Instead of the bread and wine, if you prefer a blessing, cross your hands over your chest. ■ In the Episcopal Church Baptism generally precedes receiving the bread and wine of Communion and is offered several times a year; please speak to a member of the clergy to learn more. ■






