God is our refuge and strength,






THE NEW TESTAMENT

THE GOSPEL PROCLAMATION

Matthew 24:36-44

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to the disciples, "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."

NICENE CREED BCP 358

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.


Lift up your hearts.

Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."


Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your children; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.


And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,




PRAYER FOR SPIRITUAL COMMUNION on behalf of those participating remotely

An Advent Note (Part 1)

Advent is a season of anticipation. We go to great lengths in anticipation of the celebration of our Lord's birth. We also anticipate the return of Christ in judgment. Both of these "Advents" show God coming to us for the purpose of setting things right. In addition to our anticipation of 1) the past coming of Christ as a baby, and (2) the future return of Christ to judgment, we also live in daily anticipation of (3) Christ coming into our lives. That's right, we can eagerly anticipate Christ's arrival every day!

What might show us Christ is present? The Bible texts for Advent are helpful here. We hear visions of the "end" in terms of economic justice, prosperity, and peace. We also hear about God's power made perfect in weakness. The story the birth of Jesus reminds us of the astonishing news that God would risk such vulnerability for our sakes. We hear of a God who cares and is present.

And we need Christ's presence now more than ever. One way we can reassure ourselves of Christ's coming is to remind ourselves of how God has been faithful to God's people in the past. We can see God's faithfulness over the course of one lifetime or over many lifetimes—as we get from Scripture.

In the words of Psalm 46, we hear the Psalmist find refuge in the Lord. Even though the earth changes, the mountains tremble, and the waters of the world roar, we hear again the promise of the goodness of God. The Psalm invites us to "be still" and know that God is still there and we find rest. The Psalm invites us to trust that our God—a God who wills redemption, abundance, and peace—is with us and we are reenergized to share the good news and resume God's work in the world. Come, O Come, Lord, Come!

An Advent Note (Part 2)

During the Sundays of Advent, you'll note that we are incorporating more "stillness" in our Sunday liturgy. We invite you to let that "quiet" infuse your Advent experience of God and God's creation. To remind us of God's presence with us, now and always, we will bring pieces of Psalm 46 into our Advent worship as we did today, explicitly in the Opening Acclamation and in the second Communion hymn, and allowing more spaciousness in the Prayers of the People.

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
