FYI about Montana State Parks and Spring Meadow: Montana residents who pay the \$9 state parks fee with their annual vehicle registration have no daily entrance fees to state park. For residents who do not include this in their vehicle registration is required to pay the nonresident day use fee (\$8 per vehicle). These fees can be paid either in person or online ahead of time.

Spring Meadow Lake State Park is located off of Hwy 12 west, north on Joslyn to Country Club Avenue.

Pets are only permitted in the park from October 16 to April 14 and must always be on a leash.

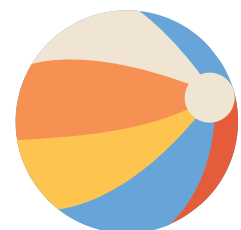

Belonging and Believing

Stephen Brehe, Dean emeritus
and canon for formation

When it comes to being a member of the church, what comes first? Belonging or believing?

For decades, the standard approach to church life was rigid and linear: you had to believe the right doctrines before you were allowed to truly belong. But when we look at the Gospels, we see something quite different.

Jesus didn't check theological credentials at the door. He invited people to "come, follow me"; long before they understood his divinity, and he shared meals with anyone who sat down, prioritizing hospitality over a doctrinal checklist.

As Episcopalians, this relational grace is built into our spiritual DNA. You might even say we are "secret Celts" quietly carrying on that ancient Celtic tradition where community forms the very soil where faith can grow. We don't ask you to pass an examination to enter. Instead, we invite you into a shared rhythm. We gather, we sit at the table, and we pray together.

Our tradition holds a beautiful conviction: *lex orandi, lex credendi*. That's Latin for "prayer shapes belief" (literally, the law of praying is the law of believing). We aren't rigid about minor details or policing doubts. We know that by simply showing up, breathing in the liturgy, and leaning into the warmth of Christian community, our hearts are slowly and gently transformed.

Belonging creates the safe, loving space that ultimately leads to believing. A wide range of people are welcome here exactly as they are, with all their questions and uncertainties.

So, whether you are brand new to this faith community, a recent arrival, or somewhere in between: come sit with us, pray with us, and see how the rhythm of this family shapes your soul.

The Power of Connection: Join Our Prayer Chain

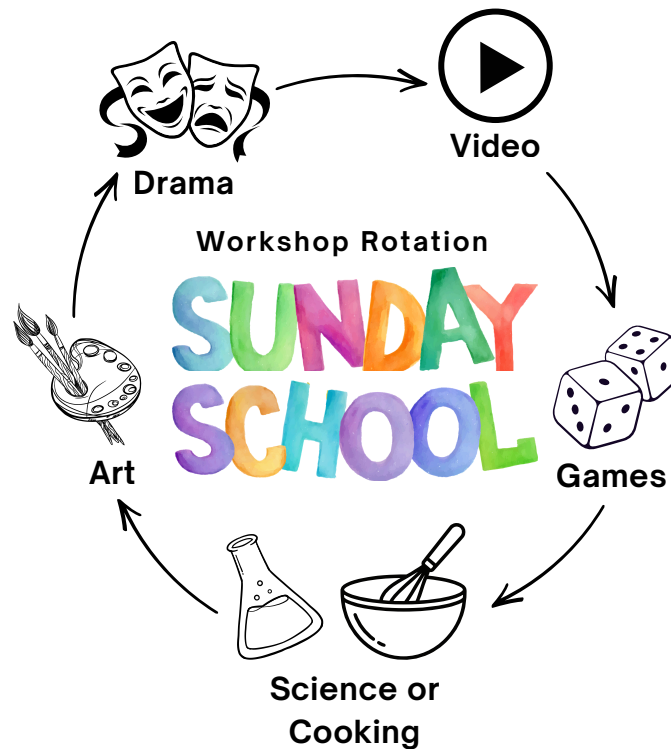

We're Trying Something New with Sunday School

In Workshop Rotation Sunday School, we teach the same Bible story for 4 to 5 weeks in a row to all our elementary students. Each week classes rotate into a new and unique workshop (art, video, games, drama, science/cooking).

Why Rotate?

- By slowing down the rate of story change, the Workshop Rotation Model deepens the student's experience and memory.
- Each workshop focuses on a different creative learning style or "intelligence," which broadens memory.
- Teachers are recruited for the workshop of their strength and choice and only teach every four to five weeks.
- For \$45/year, we can use www.rotation.org for all of our lessons.

Our families with young children need YOU!

Workshop Leaders: lead a workshop once every 4-5 weeks

Shoppers: purchase (and get reimbursed for) supplies

Lesson Prep: organize materials, ingredients, and supplies needed for each week

Episcopalians take the Bible seriously!

How seriously? Well, at worship on most Sundays, we hear an Old Testament selection (plus an excerpt from a Psalm). Then we hear two readings from the New Testament—usually one from the Letters (Epistles) and one from the Gospels. We read in a three-year cycle with a focus each year on one of the first three Evangelists: Matthew (Year A), Mark (Year B), or Luke (Year C)—and every year includes bits from John. A lot of Scripture!—right?

We also may hear readings from the Apocrypha, books written in the period between the two Testaments. And to cover even more biblical territory, whichever year we're in (A, B, or C), during the season after Pentecost, the Dean picks one of two different Old Testament “tracks” or series of readings, and each comes with its own Psalm. Twice the variety!

Track 1 follows major stories as Israel's history with God unfolds: patriarchs and wilderness wandering; household drama; good kings and bad kings; and some of the prophets' exhortations. In Track 2, Old Testament readings reflect themes in the Gospel excerpts for that particular Sunday—less of a chronological journey and more of a topical exploration.

In 2026, the Dean has selected Track 2 for us. This year (the “Matthew” year) features Old Testament readings about God's relationship with Israel, God's promises and mighty acts. Next year (the “Mark” year), we hear about the use and abuse of power and kingship; and in Year C (the “Luke” year), we hear God's ongoing call to be bearers of justice and mercy. And every year, we hear Old Testament stories that prepare us for Jesus to break into our lives!

That's a lot of Bible! But even if you're here every single Sunday for six years (to include both “track 1” and “track 2”), you'd hear only about 15% of the Old Testament. The good news (pun intended!) is that you'll hear about 90% of the Gospel stories ... although only about half of the rest of the New Testament. And all this if you come every single Sunday.



So, what's a faithful disciple to do to hear more Scripture?! One thing you could try is online Daily Morning Prayer. There, over the course of only two years—Morning Prayer is on a different lectionary schedule than we use on Sundays—we read about half of the Old Testament, and we make it through the entire New Testament two times. Bible bonus!

To give Morning Prayer a try—join us at 8:30 a.m., Monday through Saturday. (No pressure to show up every single day, just come when you can—some of us make it only once or twice a week.) From St. Peter's homepage at www.spchelena.org/, click “Virtual Center” on the menu bar and then the Morning Prayer link under “Worship and Services.” It's that easy!

Come and delve more deeply into this inspired library of books that opens some of our history—you'll probably hear stories you've never heard before! It's so worth it.

 Grace Camp	June 29 – July 3	FREE	Grace Camp is a free camp for kids who have lost a parent to incarceration, separation, or other circumstances. It is life-changing for these kids to have a place to themselves in a fun and spiritual environment.
 Junior Camp	July 14 – 17	\$450	This is for kids entering grades 3 through 6. The focus is fun, teamwork, respect, kindness and growth. Campers learn skills in swimming, kayaking, archery, music and build lasting friendships. Scholarships and sibling discounts available.
 Middler Camp	July 20 – 24	\$500	Similar to Junior Camp but for kids entering grades 6 through 8. Scholarships and sibling discounts are available.
 Senior High Camp	July 27 – Aug 1	\$525	Similar activities plus campers can design and lead their own activities under supervision. Scholarships and sibling discounts available.
 Family Camp	July 6 – 11	Adults \$525 Kids \$250 Family Cap \$1,600	Family groups of all shapes and ages are welcome. Scholarships available.
 Sensory-Friendly Family Camp	Aug 10 – 13	\$550 adults \$250 kids cap \$1,600	For those who enjoy a camp experience that is slower and quieter.
 Family Adventure Camp	Aug 3 – 7	\$550 adults \$250 kids family cap \$1,600	For senior high kids with or without family members.



Camp Marshall may be rented for retreats and other gatherings such as family reunions.

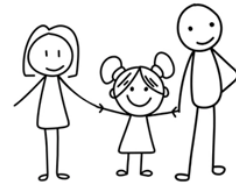

Shelter Update:

Construction of the new 16-room overnight shelter, located near Taco Bell and Arby's, continues. Family Promise continues to seek partners to support construction funding, programming, and ongoing operations. To get involved, please call (406)465-9467. Northwestern Energy is scheduled to hook up services in late July.

Family Updates:

Family 1: Mom and Dad, along with their sons (ages 6 and 2) and daughter (age 5), are currently staying at First Christian Church (FCC) due to the children's high level of needs. All three children face various physical, speech, and developmental challenges, and their parents work tirelessly to ensure they receive the services and support they need. Dad is employed as an assistant manager at Town Pump Express Car Wash, working split shifts during the week and the day shift on the weekends. Mom and Dad are exploring housing resources. They are also working with Family Promise intern Megan to achieve short-term goals and increase family stability.

Family 2: This family includes a mother (35), and a 6-year-old daughter. Mom faces some mental health challenges and currently receives disability benefits. She enjoys reading and listening to music. Megan, our Family Promise intern, meets with Mom weekly to help build life skills and provide ongoing support. Family Promise staff are looking to find alternative housing with a higher level of services to best support this family's needs.

Family 3: Dad (46) and two sons (ages 6 and 3) are currently navigating a difficult custody situation. Dad is receiving workers' compensation following a shoulder injury sustained while working in construction. To help cover legal expenses, he supplements his income through DoorDash deliveries and odd jobs. He is working hard toward greater stability by attending parenting classes, medical appointments, and financial counseling sessions. He is collaborating with Family Promise staff to develop a new parenting plan.

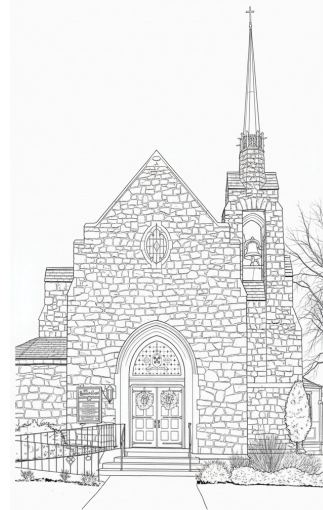
