# From the Dean

One of my "go to" closing lines for letters is "in Christ's Service." I used to interpret this as leading a "perfect" life. This is no longer my interpretation for the very practical reason that a perfect church, ministry, or family doesn't exist. And the pursuit of such perfection is going to lead to some very cranky, exhausted people.

Instead, what if being a servant of Christ means being a servant of the crucified and resurrected One? Jesus came to Earth to get be fully human. What this means for us as Jesus' disciples is we, too, are called to be present here and now. What does it look like for us to be fully present as Christ's disciples known as St. Peter's Episcopal Cathedral in Helena, Montana in 2025?

Being a servant of *Christ* also means not serving myself, which is a daily struggle. How do I recognize and renounce the temptations of this world? How do I/we relinquish the demands of my/our egos? How do we strive for faithfulness to Christ and not worldly success? As much as I want this tension to be resolved, this struggle is part of our journey. There is no point of arrival. The joy of discipleship is we get to journey together. We get to figure out what this means for us as individuals and a community together.

Being a servant of Christ ALSO means God is going to bring the answers. God promises to be faithful and show us the way. All we have to do is be open to the Spirit's guiding. # Worship News: Togendowagan Spirit Society



November is a month of gratitude and celebration. As the seasons turn and the land prepares for rest, we pause to honor the gifts that surround us: our families, our communities, our traditions, and the Creator's rich love.

During Native American Heritage Month (November), we celebrate the beauty of Native cultures that continue to flourish. In every song, every gathering, and each story we are reminded that our ways are alive and strong. When we *Rock Our Mocs* (Nov. 15), we walk with joy, carrying the prayers of our ancestors into the present, and leaving footprints of optimism for future generations.

And in this month, we also lift up *Red Shawl Day* (Nov. 19). As we wrap ourselves in red, we remember our sisters, mothers, daughters, and two-spirit people whose lives were taken too soon. Yet even here, we choose to stand in hope; believing that love is stronger than violence, that remembrance can lead to justice, and that our prayers can weave healing for future generations. The color red symbolizes the lifeblood, so wear it, and call attention to the stolen who can no longer speak for themselves.

We also pause for *Veterans' Honoring Ceremonies* (Nov. 11). Native communities have one of the highest rates of military service of any group in the United States, and we give thanks for the courage and sacrifice of our Indigenous veterans. At the same time, we honor all veterans; those who have served with bravery and devotion, carrying the weight of duty for the sake of others. Their service reminds us of the sacred teaching that to protect the people is to walk the good road. May their courage continue to inspire us to walk that road with gratitude and strength.

We also remember the story often told of the Pilgrims and the "first Thanksgiving." The truth is more layered than the simple tale: there was both mistrust and generosity, both hardship and hospitality. The Wampanoag people extended help that allowed the newcomers to survive, and together they shared a harvest feast. Yet in the years that followed, Native peoples endured loss, broken promises, and displacement. Still, our communities have carried forward resilience, faith, and the wisdom of our ancestors. To remember this fuller story is not to dwell in sorrow, but to honor the strength that has brought us here today.

This is a season of thanksgiving. We give thanks for the harvest, for the laughter of children, for the wisdom of Elders, and for the strength that comes when we walk collectively. In the words of a messenger, "The Lord has done great things for us, and we are filled with joy" (Psalm 126:3).

So let us step into this month with hearts lifted high. May our gatherings be filled with song and laughter, our prayers with gratitude, and our footsteps with purpose. May our feet carry us on the road to healing, our laughter hold us in unison, and our prayers rise with the Eagle as joy before the Maker.

Musikanten Montana will offer a candlelight memorial concert for All Souls on Saturday, November 1, at 7:30 pm, and featured guest artists contralto Anne Kania and baritone Bobb Robinson will present a duo recital on Sunday afternoon at 4. Both concerts are at St. Peter's Episcopal Cathedral.

Saturday evening's concert will feature Musikanten Montana with organist Wendy Yuen and Baroque recorders and viols in J.S. Bach's Cantata 106 "Gottes Zeit ist die allerbeste Zeit" (God's time is the best time). Memorial candles will be lighted and cantors will chant the names of those we have lost this year. ### What is in front of us? by Lizzie Carlson-Thompson

Tonight I looked out my window – there was the sun shining just perfectly in the golden hour of the evening on the tree in the boulevard. This ordinary tree was illuminated by a glow of warm radiant light. What caught my eye though were the tiny little gnats flitting around between the tree and my window. They looked like gold dust with shiny wings.



Normally, I couldn't have seen them; they are too small, too high in the air, and too camouflaged for me to notice them. It was a gift to catch this glimpse of them.

My change in perspective due to the sunshine's glow gave me pause. I wonder if this is how God sees us? He looks at us through the warmth and light of his love. We might be ordinary, overlooked, and invisible to others, but God sees us. And how God sees us is so very different than how we see ourselves – and how we see others. Seeing the light change how I looked at these "common" bugs and tree illuminated a deeper sense or longing in me. I want to see others and myself through God's eyes instead of my own clouded vision. Perhaps we can pray to wear God spectacles when we look at others and ourselves. We might just be surprised by unexpected beauty flitting in front of us.

# **Our Story**

### Henrietta Brewer & St. Peter's Church and Hospital by Patty Dean

The Queen City was not quite twenty years old in March 1883 when St. Peter's vestry gathered in its stone church on Warren and Grand to discuss plans "for maintaining a hospital building to care for the many people who were brought to Helena for medical care."

A little over a year later, in June 1884, St. Peter's Hospital Committee elected its trustees: Missionary Bishop Leighton R. Brewer, St. Peter's rector The Rev. F.T. Webb, W.D. Smith, Treasurer; Dr. J.J. Leiser, Superintendent; and Sam Jones, Secretary. The other committee members included some of Helena's wealthiest men. The Independent Record reported: "Though under the auspices of the Episcopal church, the hospital will be open to applicants...of all creeds; and will be conducted under plans adopted by similar institutions in the eastern cities. Hospital accommodations, including nursing, medicine, and medical attendance[,] will be furnished at rates the lowest possible at which the institution can be sustained."

Within days, the women of the parish organized to furnish the hospital's needs soliciting bed linens, crockery, tableware and linens, pillows, carpets and a meat safe. Within six months, there was one, in a building adjacent to the Northern Pacific depot. By January 1885, St. Peter's Hospital had been relocated downtown to the corner of Jackson and Grand Streets, conveniently just one block downhill from St. Peter's Church.

1886 was a pivotal year for St. Peter's Church and its hospital. With \$400 donated by the Connecticut Episcopal Diocese women's auxiliary, the hospital hired Miss Nina Young and two other trained nurses who traveled from New York City to Helena, arriving with great fanfare. Miss Young was a friend of Dr. Maria Dean (pronounced Ma-rye-ah) already a well-respected Helena physician.

The second significant event to take place occurred on June 11, 1886, when Articles of Incorporation were entered into by Bishop Brewer, Reverend Webb, and others "for the erection of a new hospital in Helena, to be called St Peter's Episcopal Hospital." The men looked to architects Hodgson, Stem and Welter of St. Paul, who were in the process of constructing the Lewis and Clark Co. Courthouse, to draw up plans for the building. An April 1887 newspaper article extolled the "erection of a new and elegant structure...under the argus eyes of Rev. Webb, its founder and Mrs. Brewer, its builder..."

### Henrietta Brewer & St. Peter's Church and Hospital, cont.

The mention of Bishop Brewer's wife, Henrietta Brewer, is significant as it is she to whom the existence of St. Peter's Hospital is due. The men of Helena might have founded the hospital, but it is she who brought their dream to reality. As a June 1887 newspaper article on the laying of the cornerstone recounted: "The interest and influence of the gentlemen have contributed no little to the upbuilding of this institution...but its success is due notably to the efforts of Mrs. L.R. Brewer, who has raised all the money thus far secured, besides getting the services of a corps of skilled nurses." Considering this is 1887, Henrietta's accomplishments were extraordinary.

On October 19, we dedicated a plaque to the memory of Henrietta Brewer. We also reconnected with St. Peter's Health through Stephen Mason, who works for St. Peter's Health Foundation that day. St. Peter's Health's financial support helped us to make the undercroft accessible.

But, by 1901, St. Peter's facilities could no longer accommodate Helena's needs, so Henrietta began to fundraise for an addition. Unfortunately, she died suddenly of a heart attack on St. Patrick's Day in 1903. But death could not halt the momentum of her years of inspiring philanthropy and in May 1903 a society was formed to raise \$65,000 to build a new hospital on the southwest corner of Logan Street and 11th Avenue. Fundraising was slow but the new hospital, designed by St. Paul/New York City architect Cass Gilbert whose work was well known to Helenans, opened in 1910 for a cost of \$125,000. The entrance was adorned with a plaque reading: "THE HENRIETTA BREWER MEMORIAL BUILDING OF ST. PETER'S HOSPITAL" and Matthew 25:36: "I WAS SICK, AND YE VISITED ME."

### Henrietta Brewer & St. Peter's Church and Hospital, cont.

The women of St. Peter's Church continued their close association with the hospital over the next six decades or so, organizing an annual charity ball as well as the Henrietta Brewer Memorial Tea. The tea was initiated in 1904 by Henrietta's close friend, Mrs. H.G. McIntire, who invited Henrietta's other close friends to her home for a linen and jelly shower—or gifts of cash—with the hospital the recipient. Upon Mrs. McIntire's death, her daughter and the newly organized Junior Cathedral Guild took up the tradition in 1929.

Over time, the Henrietta Brewer Memorial Tea expanded to include hostesses and guests of other religious denominations with St. Peter's nursery the beneficiary of the tea's proceeds. The last mention of the Henrietta Brewer Memorial Tea appears in a 1972 Independent Record article when it was hosted by Mrs. A.T. (Margaret) Hibbard whose home was just a couple of blocks from St. Peter's Cathedral.

None of this would have been possible, however, without one Henrietta Brewer "[who] undertook the work of establishing a hospital in Helena, a work which she carried from its very beginning with unselfish devotion, unflagging zeal and dauntless faith. In spite of many discouragements and drawbacks she saw her faith and zeal rewarded by fruition."

are staying at First Christian Church (FCC) due to the children's high needs. They continue to work on getting the middle child into a pre K program since HeadStart does not have the resources available to meet her needs. The oldest is enrolled in school. The family has a vehicle. Dad is working through Express Employment. His resume has been updated, and he is applying for other work. Mom has been watching youngest daughter during the day while they try to find suitable childcare.

**Family 3** — Dad and 4 year old son. Dad has purchased his own vehicle and is working on figuring out a more sustainable work schedule, while he saves for an apartment. Dad is working on enforcing the in place parenting plan and hoping for reunification in the near future. He recently had a job interview with a construction company which pays better. Dad's work schedule has decreased some so he will be able to be at First Christian by 9 pm.

**Family 4** –We have a new family Mom and three children (7,5, & 4). Mom has children 50/50 split between her and their father, rotating ever Wednesday at 7:30 pm. Mom is working as an interior designer and personal trainer. She is currently without a vehicle but is working hard and utilizing lots of resources. The kids all have childcare.

Please continue to pray for FP families as they tackle some pretty tough circumstances, for FP volunteers, staff and Board.
