## Scripture Reading: Acts 9:1-6, (7-20)

Being a Christian is more than just an instantaneous conversion; it is a daily process whereby you grow to be more and more like Christ. —Billy Graham





Today's Bible reading tells the incredible story of the apostle Paul's dramatic experience on the road to Damascus. As I read the account, I reviewed other conversion stories from the annals of church history. My mind immediately went to Saint Augustine of Hippo (354–430), then to Martin Luther's experience a little more than a thousand years later in A.D.1517.

But then consider the case of an 18<sup>th</sup>-century slave trader. His name was John Newton (1725–1807). Newton had a troubled youth, working on slave ships and living a life of moral recklessness. His conversion occurred in 1748 during a violent storm at sea. Fearing for his life, Newton cried out to God for mercy, and the ship was miraculously spared.

The experience was unnerving and understandably caused Newton to reevaluate his life. He abandoned the slave trade and became an Anglican priest. He later became a passionate advocate for the abolition of slavery, working alongside figures like William Wilberforce and others. So complete was his transformation from sinner to saint, that it was memorialized in one of the most famous hymns of recorded history, "Amazing Grace."

One more example of amazing conversions: C.S. Lewis (1898–1963), the renowned author and Christian apologist. For much of his early life, Lewis was an atheist, deeply skeptical of religion in general and Christianity in particular. However, after a series of intellectual and spiritual struggles, he began to feel drawn to Christianity. Influenced by his friends, such as J.R.R. Tolkien, and through his own reading, Lewis eventually converted in 1931.

He described his conversion in his book, *Surprised by Joy*, where he writes about the moment he reluctantly gave in to God's call, calling himself "the most dejected and reluctant convert in all England." His conversion led him to become one of the most influential Christian thinkers of the 20th century with works like *Mere Christianity, The Screwtape Letters, A Grief Observed* and others — reaching millions with the message of faith.

God's power to transform lives is truly powerful and amazing!
