THE PRELIMINARIES

Voting Eligibility at the Annual Meeting

In accordance with The Episcopal Church Canon Law and St. Peter's Cathedral By-Laws:

1.1 Qualifications of Voting Members

Any person who is a communicant of St. Peter's Cathedral, duly listed in the Cathedral Register, in good standing, and sixteen years of age or older shall automatically be a voting member of the corporation. All members voting at meetings shall sign an attendance form, which shall be attached to the official minutes of that meeting.

Approve 2023 Annual Meeting Minutes

The annual meeting was called to order by Dean Scott Anderson at 10:45 a.m.

Laura Brown will serve as Clerk for this meeting. The minutes from 2022 were approved as corrected.

Introduction of the present Chapter members and they were thanked for their service. Candidates for election to the Chapter were; Sam Gilbert (two yr. Term) and Scott Leak, Melinda Schell, Vicki Tiberi and Ray Paige will serve 3 yr. terms. Chuck Johnson moved that the slate be elected and Lizzy Carlson Thompson seconded it. The motion was passed.

Convention delegates were elected as follows. Charlotte Eskildsen, Chas Elliott, Melinda Schell, Kathy Johnson, and Jenny Eckwortzel. Jean O'Connor and Janet Kirkland will serve as alternates.

Bishop Marty Stebbins gave a report on the General Convention and also on the Lambeth Conference.

Budget: Kurt Fuehrer reviewed the budget for 2022 and current assets. Rick Johnson reviewed Stewardship and stated the last year pledging was 100%. The amount pledged for this year has met our goal. Jenny Eckwortzel moved that the budget be accepted and Ron Gumbert seconded it. It was passed.

Endowment; Charlie Briggs reported that the endowment had a decrease of 11% due to the economy, but it received several donations which offset this decrease. The church budget will receive \$17,000 from interest generated this year.

Ministry Reports; Laura Brown presented the Martha Veach Volunteer of the year award to Phillip Witkamp for his outstanding work. The Bargain Basement gave over \$39,000.00 to the church this past year. Social Concerns supports 9 different causes throughout the year. Donna Church thanked the church for the support given to Family Promise.

Fr. Scott said this is A Year For Our Voice to Be Heard. The Next 100 Years Capital Campaign begins now. The goal is to raise 1 million dollars. It is for planning for the future. Jim brown gave a History of the St. Peters and then Dan Carlson Thompson gave us an overview of what is needed: The rest of the roof replacement, ramps, Security and Fire protection, elevator, ventilation system, and a contingency fund. The campaign has already received over \$500,000 towards our goal and a matching 1-for-1 donation of \$100,000.00 for pledges coming in after this kick off date. Please make checks out to St. Peter's with the memo Capital Campaign.

THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN REPORT

The Next One Hundred Years Campaign: Preserving the past, planning for the Future

Thank you, thank you. We can't do the capital campaign without you. St Peter's continues to be committed to the Helena community and beyond. On April 11, 2024 at the Helena Civic Center, St Peter's Episcopal Cathedral along with several Helena area nonprofits will be sponsoring a community art event. The Heart of Helena Art Show and Auction will be held to support and serve the Helena community. Proceeds raised from the auction will go to the community agencies your social concerns dollars support.

We began the planning for the campaign in late 2020; we had the kick off campaign at our 2022 Annual meeting. With your generous giving, we have raised over \$800,000, to date. This includes \$45,000 in grant awards. We will continue to explore grant opportunities. If you know of any grant opportunities, please contact someone on the Capital Committee.

Objectives of the Campaign

- 1. New Roof. A roof replacement has been accomplished over the church space. An additional portion of the original building is still in need of replacement.
- 2. Accessibility. An elevator combined with other structural adaptations need to be incorporated into our 90-year- old building so that all people can have easy and functional access to all parts of the building. We will be completing the ramp construction for this project by Easter of 2024.
- 3. Updated Ventilation System. In order to assure that the church provides a healthy environment, significant repairs are needed to our air handling system.
- 4. Other Important Projects: Fire & Security System, Solar Panels, Kitchen Upgrades & Samp; Repairs, Bathroom Modernization, Parking Lot & Samp; Other Delayed Maintenance and Repairs.
- 5. Re-establish a perpetual maintenance fund in order to be able to have an ongoing capacity to maintain our structure and equipment.
- 6. Supporting and serving the Helena Community and beyond.
- 7. Throughout local & Depression, A World at War, and many natural disasters through conversation,

worship, and meeting basic needs. Archbishop Desmond Tutu came to SPEC in 1990 to help support Native American and South African Children.

THE ENDOWMENT REPORT

St. Peter's Parish Endowment Fund begins 2024 with a balance of \$475,510, which is a net positive change in value of \$50,301 since January 1, 2023, with \$425,209 the fund balance.

Early in 2023, the Parish Endowment Board finalized and approved its Endowment Investment Policy. In addition, the board changed its investment management from Allstate managed endowment assets, to Stockman's Wealth Management, for managing St. Peter's portfolio. This change is positive from a number of standpoints. The board is now working with a local, Helena Stockman's team, who attend the Board's quarterly meetings. Also, the Board was able to negotiate less management fees than before. Stockman's also manages the Diocesan Endowment portfolio.

In February, as required by its bylaws, the Board contributed to the Chapter \$16,952 in annual dividends generated in 2022. Those funds are intended to assist with ongoing financial operations of the parish. Donations to the Endowment in 2023 were \$2,100.

Parishioners who donate money, stocks, bonds or funds from their estate are able to lower their tax liability, as well as other potential benefits. Also, donations to the Endowment remain gifts to benefit St. Peter's Church in perpetuity, without touching its principal.

Endowment Board members are: Charlie Briggs, president; Rachel Robison, treasurer; Mark Kelley, secretary; Vicki Rauser, Ruth Ann Shuler, and Dean Scott Anderson. The Board meets quarterly.

Bargain Basement

The Bargain Basement (affectionately known as the BB) was started as a ministry in 1983 by Martha Lee Veatch (mother of Gail Hewitt and mother-in-law of Dean Arch Hewitt) with the purpose of providing the Helena community with "gently used items at an affordable price." Originally located in the basement of the church, the BB moved to the bottom level of Wilson Hall in 2013.

This year, we have provided the Cathedral with \$46,814, which is 20% higher than what was given last year. We could not have done this without the donations we receive, our dedicated volunteers, or our loyal customers. We have become a vital part of the Helena community. Forty percent of our volunteers are not members of our congregation, but they volunteer because they believe in our mission. Most of our donations also come from outside the parish.

The BB accepts donations of clothing (adult and children), shoes, household items, books, jewelry, decorative items, framed art, tools, games/puzzles, bedding, lamps, and small pieces of furniture such as chairs, end tables, and bookcases. (We cannot accept electronics, sports equipment or luggage.)

Our ministry depends on volunteers, and we can always use more, both men and women. If you would like to volunteer, please contact Laura Brown at 406-431-1253 to schedule a training session. Volunteers always work in pairs so you would be paired with an experienced volunteer when you started. You can choose to work one day a week, once a month, or be a substitute.

Cursillo Kathy Johnson

Back in March 2023 a planning Ultreya was held at Camp Marshall to see about jump starting the Montana Cursillo, which has been absent for a long time in this diocese. Cursillo is a way to strengthen your faith walk. It is not a cult or a replacement for regular attendance at church.

It originally began in the late 1940's in Spain in the Roman Catholic Church and then found it's way to the United States in 1957. The first Episcopal Cursillo weekend was held in 1970 with the help of the Roman Catholic Church. A Cursillo weekend is either 2 or 3 days and is filled with love, study, prayer, devotions and songs not to mention lots of good food.

After one has attended a weekend, one attends Ultreyas which are kind of like a mini weekend. Ultreyas are also open to who are interested in attending one. All Cursillistas are encouraged to actively gather in small groups called a 4th day group. Think of a 4th day group as something that helps keep you on track in your spiritual growth and renewal.

So at that initial Ultreya in March, the Secretariat was formed. The Secretariat is like a board which helps guide Montana Cursillo with the Bishop's help. I said I'd be on the Secretariat for at least 2 years. We've had several Zoom meetings since that time as we live all over the state.

One of the things we set as a goal was to see if some of us could be on the team for a Cursillo weekend somewhere and take some candidates with us. We finally had an opportunity to do so in October for the women's Cursillo #254 in Los Angelos. We had three team members: Ruth Ann Massey and myself from St. Peters and Nancy Shively from St Andrews in Polson. Plus we had three Candidates: Susan Jensen from St. Andrews and Heather & Skeeter Lingle from St. John's in Butte.

That was an awesome experience for all involved, not to mention it was a lot warmer than it was back here in Montana. Nancy & I were the primary source of music for the weekend, Nancy & Ruth Ann were table leaders and I also helped in the kitchen. One comes away tired but renewed. You feel recharged.

The next step for those of us in Montana is to hold Ultreyas and get 4th day groups started/restarted. And then the Secretariat hopes to hold a Cursillo weekend sometime this year. All this is part of what Bishop Curry calls the "Jesus Movement." You can find a video from him about Cursillo on the National Episcopal website: https://www.episcopalcursilloministry.org/. We also have a Cursillio webpage on the Montana Diocesan website but it's a work in process. Keep checking on it as we improve it. Ideas are always welcome.

St. Peters is holding the first Ultreya on February 10th in the undercroft starting at 10:30 am and ending about 2 pm. We will hold the reunion portion first followed by communion and then a potluck lunch. St. Peters will provide the meat, rolls and potatoes and beverages. So attendees can bring salads, sides and desserts. If you can make your dish gluten free, that would be nice as some folks are gluten intolerant.

If you play an instrument, please let me know so I can get music to you ahead of time and then bring it along. Oh and if any of you have bright table decorations and Roosters or Chicken statues, bring those.

Junior Warden' Report

Chapter Junior Warden

Sara and Tim Johnson sponsor a contract with The Little Lawn Guys for Spring power raking, weekly mowing, fence and sidewalk trimming and blowing off the sidewalks on Friday afternoons. Sara also keeps the shrubbery in top shape. Spieker Sprinkler Systems keeps the lawn irrigation system going and Nitro Green does the seasonal fertilizer applications. This keeps our grounds looking very nice. Our previous snow plower dropped us because of his workload, but a new contractor has been hired that did a good job following the early November snow storm. The spruce trees on the south end of Wilson Hall were checked for rot and dead branches that could be reached with a pole saw were removed.

Our church sexton, Bill Eyman, keeps our facilities clean and orderly.

Clarks Plumbing & Heating and Eagle Electric have helped with maintenance issues such as replacing the water shutoff valve to Wilson Hall, installing new regulators on the furnace boiler, fixing difficult leaking fixtures and correcting or replacing electrical problems. A continuing problem is the partially plugged sink in the sacristy. Chemical cleaners cannot be used in it and corners in the line have prevented a roto-rooter from being effective. We might have to open some walls to change those angles. The light sockets in the nave portion of the church are of an old design and we are getting down to the last of the bulbs that will fit them. We will have to replace those sockets in the next couple of years. A parish member has purchased motion-activated light switches that can be placed in areas of the church where lights frequently get left on.

A major project was repainting the inside of the nave and portions of the undercroft by Big Sky Finishes. Paint was peeling because of leakage from the roof. They also repainted the outside of the front door of the church. It faces west and thus is exposed to direct rays from the sun. Also, rain splashes up on it and the paint was starting to peel.

Replacing steps with ramps, installing an elevator and replacing at least the flat portions of the roof on the remainder of the building will be some of the items to be funded by the Capital Campaign. A volunteer effort is being organized to clean and re-stain the woodwork in the nave area of the Cathedral. We will also be working on a volunteer Saturday in the Spring to spruce up the grounds.

Music Charles Elliott
Director of Music

As we continue to rebuild the music program at the Cathedral, a new vocal ensemble has been added to the roster. The Cathedral Schola joins the Cathedral Choir, the St. Cecilia Choir, and the Parish Choir. The choir programs will be restructured in early 2024.

The Cathedral's three pianos have been tuned and improved by Elizabeth Heppler from Heppler Pianos in Manhattan, MT. Rose City Organ Builders from Portland, OR continues to tune and maintain our pipe organ. Although updated in 2006, our organ needs some major work to correct errors made during the that update. The solo trumpets in the rear of the Nave were disconnected in the spring of 2022 due to rodent damage and the installation of used equipment that had not been refurbished. The Cathedral possesses one of the two finest pipe organs in Helena, and discussions

continue to bring it back to full capacity and maintain its quality. Further research must be done to discover how to fund this major project.

We have expanded our resources for music materials. In addition to the 1982 Hymnal, hymns are chosen from the Episcopal hymnals Lift Every Voice and Sing, Voices Found, My Heart Sings Out, and Worship, Love, and Praise. We are also authorized to use Gather, 2nd edition, and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America hymnals. Additional materials are obtained using annual subscriptions to St. James Music Press, Prelude Music Planner, and Concordia Publishing House. Chanting the Psalms was reintroduced at several services in 2023 and will continue in 2024. Chants are selected from several sources to compliment each season of the Church Year. Additional Mass settings have also been added and are rotated by season.

The piano in the Nave has joined the organ as an important part of our musical worship. It is used exclusively on Sundays following the Day of Pentecost through Rally Sunday in early September, and once each month during the academic year. Throughout the year Cathedral members have provided additional musical offerings on a variety of instruments.

Besides the two regular Sunday services and festival services, the Cathedral music program contributes to the annual Service of Lessons and Carols, Sunday afternoon Taizé services during Advent and Lent, and occasional Touchmark services.

The Social Concerns Commission had an active 2023. We continued with our monthly meetings and financial support of local organizations and, also provided opportunities for parish members to participate in community service.

Funding for Social Concerns includes a monthly appropriation from the Chapter budget, Flipper Sunday revenue, the plate offerings from Christmas and Easter, and individual contributions. A special thanks to those who buy and sell chocolate to support our efforts. Our resources are limited and sometimes our funding runs low. For that reason, we are pursuing other funding with the Heart of Helena Art sale and a consignment account at the Bargain Basement future possibilities.

Social Concerns has been making \$100 a month, payments to ten local organizations in 2023. These include God's Love, YWCA, Helena Food Share, Friendship Center, Salvation Army, Head Start, Family Promise, Florence Crittenton, Good Samaritan, and the Personal Needs Pantry. In addition, we are able to provide additional food and personal hygiene items thanks to the generous contributions deposited in the back of the Church. This year we collected 427 pounds of food. The personal hygiene items are provided to the Personal Needs Pantry through a working relationship with GFWC Helena Women's Club. Episcopal Relief and Development also receives a \$100 per month contribution which reflects our concern and commitment for the great needs of people around the world.

In addition to the contributions Social Concerns also provides opportunities to participate in community activities. During 2023 we were involved with Helena Food Share, Family Promise and Meals on Wheels. One meal was provided at God's Love. The Social Concerns Commission thanks all who have supported us and invite any church member to come join us.
